## INTEGRAL EDUCATION WORKSHOP

### Phase II - Bangalore

The Phase II was held in Bangalore in the AMIS campus between 18th May 2015 and 26th May 2015. The main focus was on training and methods of Integral Education and gave a rigorous training regrading their application.

#### **ASSEMBLY**

We all gather together in the morning assembly to calm our minds and prepare our body and spirit to begin our day. During the workshop, we Diyas recreated the assembly that our children have each morning, in school. Every assembly began with the usual silence, which was followed by a prayer song or the chanting of a shloka. Based on the mind map, each group estimated the time that would be required to complete the project and accordingly allotted responsibilities to each member of the group and decided on how to present the gathered information.



When we gathered after about a week, all geared up for the presentations, it was an extremely enriching experience to see the different types of presentations made by the groups. Some presented their themes in the form of a play, while others recited poems or sang songs. Some used sketches, charts and models to display their information. Through the project not only did we independently learn various

aspects of the topics chosen by us but we also enjoyed working with each other and at the end were awed by the display of various innovative thoughts and ideas of presentation.

#### **TECHNOLOGY**

In order to help the Diyas with use of technology, in our day to day work, there were a few sessions on the basics of computer, during the summer workshop this year.
