Why don't you have uniforms for the children in your school?

This is a question that pops up often enough before many of us, so it's worth sharing our perspective. When it comes to making choices, we have to choose between two or more goods, and not a simplistic 'good vs. evil' debate. We have to select our hue from the rainbow. Not that there is anything wrong with the other strands, it's just not the one you pulled from the colourful fabric that stretched before you. So why did we choose to not have uniforms for our little ones?

For one, we wanted to create a different learning environment. An environment where the heart could flow and flourish, where children felt comfortable and at ease, where learning didn't become synonymous with a straight jacketed approach, rigid and strict lines, dull and dreary routines, and mere mechanical memorisation. If we can help a child to grow freely, develop a capacity to flow and love, we've given her/him a great gift. Our effort is to not 'administer' learning but help to facilitate it. This is a different paradigm, it requires efforts that explore dimensions that many of us haven't had a chance to experience as children, it calls for some definitive changes and departures from traditional models of organised education. Here's the challenge - we are not talking about a utopia where angels descend and make a magic world, we are talking about the world all of us live in. We are our own angels and magicians, we have to make the change! That can be a really tall order!

What does this have to do with not having uniforms you may wonder, can't we do this while they wear the same clothes every day? How can we do away with the wisdom that suggests that all are equal, besides, you don't have to bother thinking what the child will wear the next day and children will not pester parents to buy them 'those' clothes! True, uniforms do make life easy in many ways. As children grow, especially as they reach their teens, discipline becomes an important quality which needs to be inculcated. Uniforms may be helpful at a later stage, and we will consider this for older children.

For younger children, a more colourful and friendly environment is reinforced by letting them come in colourful, every day clothes (with a suggested dress code), rather than a 'uniform'. This is in line with our other features which help to give more 'space' for expression - open classrooms with fluid spaces, a rich natural environment (yes, it is okay to climb a tree and read here!), small class numbers, easy access to teachers, headmistress, staff and any other 'authority figures'. If the child is not to become just another Xerox copy or identical 'product', is to receive individual attention, is to grow with confidence then a free flowing, natural environment certainly helps. A child is seen as an entity and a presence, with her/his own identity and journey. An environment is often subtly absorbed and growth happens wordlessly, without direct 'lessons', so we try to have colour and fragrance, light and beauty through children and flowers.



Janguages Tools to make learning of languages like Hindi and Kannada easy was demonstrated as the importance of




language learning was emphasised on. Children presented poems and number rhymes in all the languages.

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






A perfectly symmetrical star is hidden in the design below. Can you find it?
